From Your President:



As many of you know, the work that we do as a grassroots conservation organization often encounters headwinds, not the least of which is climate change. The science behind climate change could not be clearer: we need to take immediate and meaningful steps to reduce our carbon emissions. The support for such a program from Pennsylvanians could not be clearer, but too many elected officials are sponsoring/enacting legislation that is counter to a clean and safe environment.

For example, House Bill 732, which passed in the General Assembly in July despite widespread opposition from environmental advocacy groups across the state. House Bill 732 doles out more than \$670 million in taxpayer subsidies to the petrochemical industry for the next 25 years; to incentivize the construction of more polluting factories. With this legislation, our state officials are wooing more petrochemical plants to Pennsylvania.

State Sen. Gene Yaw will soon introduce legislation that would establish bonding requirements for project developers who seek to install or operate commercial wind or solar electric generation and other renewable energy facilities in Pennsylvania, a not-so-thinly veiled attempt to make it cost-prohibitive for these types of projects to proceed.

Senator Yaw’s Senate Bill 619, which recently passed the senate, cuts back existing regulations and fundamentally changes water protections in Pennsylvania by amending our Clean Streams Law. It allows those who pollute to determine if it is a reportable event or not. There was a hearing in the house in late September, but there is still time to voice your concerns to your legislator.

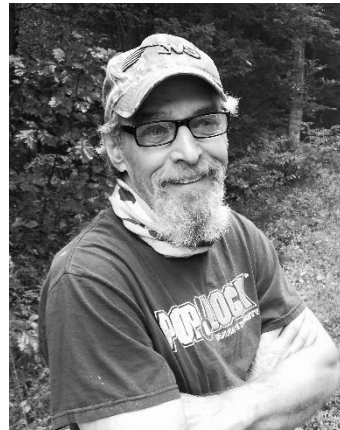

Doc Fritchey's First Fund-Raising, On-Line Auction – November 10 to November 19th

Traditionally, the Doc Fritchey Chapter raises almost all the money we need to carry out our conservation and stewardship mission on one evening in late winter, at our annual conservation fund-raising banquet. We all know how that worked out in March of 2020: We all stayed home and started to learn how to social distance and wear a mask when we went out in public.

So, because the chapter still needs to raise money to carry out an aggressive mission, we are using National Trout Unlimited's newly-created on-line-fund-raising auction website to conduct our first on-line-auction. Based on what we have learned from the Donegal Chapter and the Cumberland Valley Chapter, we expect our members will enthusiastically bid on the forty-eight items our committee has solicited from friends, vendors, members, and organizations that support our chapter's conservation mission.

Starting on November 10th and ending on November 19th - a minute before midnight - the auction will be conducted on **DFTU.org**. You will find a button on the home page that will take you directly to the on-line auction. Everything we are offering, and all the details on how to bid and pay for the items you buy will be right there. This auction is an English-style auction, which is what is typical in the auction houses scattered around central Pennsylvania. We have listed an opening bid amount for each item, and we have listed the minimum amount required to increase a bid. Bidders must register and provide credit card information before starting to bid. Note: A slight delay occurs from the time you bid until your bid registers on the auction site.

If you are the winner of one of the items in either the "Fishing Trips" or "Outings/Tours" categories, we will mail your certificate to you. All other items must be picked up at Bob Pennell's home in Harrisburg. If you are unable to pick up your item, we can arrange to have it shipped to you. You will be required to pay the actual shipping cost.

The website (**DFTU.org**) includes detailed descriptions of all forty-eight items, with color photos. The donors' names are included with all items.

Please mark your calendars for the 10th of November and please bid aggressively. Again, **DFTU.org** takes you to the auction site. Good luck, happy bidding, and we look forward to seeing in March of 2021 at our next live, in-person fund-raising banquet at the Holiday Inn in Grantville.

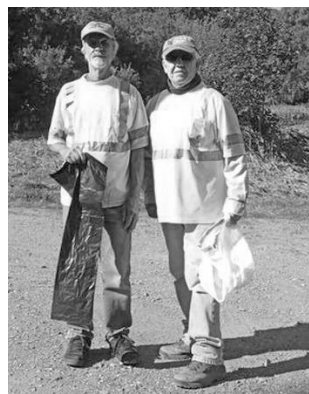
E-Mail Addresses are Essential

Julie, we sincerely appreciate your help. We raised \$2,720 because you are a friend of Doc Fritchey, all of which will be spent on upgrades to our Rausch Creek Diversion Well. Snitz Creek Project Complete

Thanks to the dauntless efforts of chapter president Russ Collins, the chapter's more than two year project to rehabilitate 1,200 feet of Snitz Creek in Lebanon County is complete. Final payments from the Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission have been received and the contractors have been fully paid. Because the property was recently sold, a new Landowner-Grantee Agreement was executed with the new owners. Going forward, the chapter is responsible for normal repairs and maintenance, and for the removal of debris that accumulates on the installed structures or which may contribute to streambank erosion.

Fall Trout Stocking – Fall-Winter Schedule

Because of the Covid-19 crisis, the Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission is not permitting volunteers to assist in any way with late-season stocking and is only reporting a one-week window on their website when individual streams may/will be stocked. During the fall and winter of 2020, the PFBC will stock approximately 120,000 adult trout into select waterways statewide. We are all, of course, hopeful that come March of 2021, the Doc Fritchey volunteers that regularly float stock our favorite, special-regulations streams will once again be permitted to participate.

Drought Conditions Threaten Trout

For the last two months our state has been hard hit with lack of rainfall, coupled with a record number of summer days with air temperatures at 90 degrees and above. As a result, the dissolved oxygen levels in many of our favorite trout streams have critically affected the fish. Trout become highly stressed and hooking one and playing it endangers the very life of the fish. Although many of us practice and preach "Catch and Release," in these drought conditions, even this philosophy can still render irreparable harm and even death to some trout.

Annual Work Day on the Chapter's Rausch Creek Diversion Well

About a dozen Doc Fritchey volunteers came out to the chapter's limestone diversion wells (3.3 miles in from Gold Mine Road, where the Appalachian trail crosses Rausch Creek, a tributary of Stony Creek in northwest Lebanon County) to remove an older intake filter and install a new, improved filter, and - thanks to the erosive power of water which had created a significant diversion around the intakes for the two wells - create a permanent remediation solution. As he did a year ago, Steve Mack once again constructed a new stainless steel and fiberglass filter, which he and his wife Roxanne brought to the worksite.



Does this remind you of the California gold rush?

Six of our volunteers spent two hours in cold, knee-deep water, first removing the old filter and then removing half a ton of rocks to make way for the new, more-efficient filter. Once the new filter was in place, three, twenty-foot, previously cut and drilled logs, were carried in and placed by six other volunteers alongside the two filters to remediate a serious erosion problem. After the three logs were installed with rebar reinforcements, the undercut bank was filled with large rocks: all by hand, one large rock at a time. A job well done.

Dennis Coffman organized the installation effort and fed the crew sandwiches and cupcakes when we were finished.

Comment from the editor – Even though the work performed on this cool, drizzly Sunday afternoon was hard, intensive work, done mostly by older men (almost everyone involved was past retirement age), masks were worn all day and without complaint. It was understood by everyone that as this work required close contact and was strenuous, to be sure, with social distancing difficult or impossible, masks were to be properly worn. It was impressive.

Diversion Well Fall and Winter Schedule

Effective the first Sunday in October, the weekly work session on the diversion well moves to 1:00 PM on Sunday afternoon. Please feel free to meet the crew at the gate on Gold Mine Road any Sunday afternoon this fall or winter. They'll take you deep into St. Anthony's Wilderness - the 2nd largest roadless, wilderness tract of land in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Quittapahilla Water Monitoring Program

Our monitoring program for the Quittapahilla Watershed is off to a slow start, partly because of restrictions related to the COVID 19 pandemic. But, lately, we have picked up the activities and now the program is coming together very nicely. The program will include six monitoring locations, two on the mainstem Quittapahilla Creek and one on each of the four major tributaries (Snitz, Beck, Bachman, and Killinger). We will have continuous recordings of streamflow and temperature and periodic samples for water contaminants such as nutrients, sediment, and metals.

In August and September, we had four work days where our volunteers worked to install stilling wells and staff plates on bridge wing walls at our monitoring locations. The stilling wells now house pressure transducers to give the needed continuous record of water level which we will convert to stream flow.

Our volunteers handled every task beautifully. They even proved that four heads are better than one. Our initial choice for a monitoring location on Snitz Creek was at the Walnut Street bridge. This location was problematic because it would have needed a lot of digging, would have required an intake pipe to the stilling well, and would have been prone to sedimentation. The volunteer crew suggested that we needed to rethink this decision. We

took a look at the bridge over Snitz Creek at Dairy Road and decided to move the monitoring location to the Dairy Road site. Excellent decision!

Now, we are almost ready to begin the actual water-quality sampling. We need to survey each of the monitoring sites, get educated about our pressure transducers, and learn how to make manual streamflow measurements.

We also need some training from the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection, and we need special access to the PA DEP laboratory, which will analyze our samples.

Finally, our volunteers will also collect macroinvertebrate samples and deliver them to Lebanon Valley College for identification and analysis.

We have a big job ahead, but our volunteers seem more than up for the task. Volunteers who have assisted with the installations include Gary Zelinske, Willie Bixler, Stephan Vegoe, Trip McGarvey, David Ethridge, and Mike Schroeder. Thanks for your great work.

Upwards of 98 percent of our watershed's waters are still considered "impaired" by PA-DEP – mainly the consequence of excessive sediment and nutrient runoff from cropland and livestock operations. We're working collaboratively with the Lebanon County Stormwater Consortium, the Lebanon County Conservation District, Doc Fritchey Trout Unlimited, local municipalities, and other groups and entities, public and private, to address these many impairments in ways that give us the "biggest bang for the buck" for the grant monies we receive from PA-DEP's Growing Greener program, the EPA's 319 grant programs, and other funding agencies. Fishing Trips

Fishing Trip w/Overnight Stay at HomeWaters Club

Troutbitten

It was a little more than two years ago when Bellefonte-based fly fishing guide and author Dom Swentosky came to a Doc Fritchey chapter meeting and made quite an impression. Those of us there that evening learned to tie the Davey Knot and we learned about Darcey yarn strike indicators, and we also learned that the correct word for a strike indicator is not "bobber" but rather it's a *suspender*, a word Dom Swentosky "borrowed" from his friend George Daniel.

If you have not discovered him, Dom Swentosky is a brilliant fly fishing writer. His almost daily postings on his website - **Troutbitten** - have become "must-reads" for fly fishermen across the country. The best part about Dom's writing is that it is absolutely free. Go to his website and register and you'll start to get his emails. Certainly, he sells gear on his site, but he does that in a way you barely notice. **Troutbitten.com** is a great resource for fly fishermen.
