From Your President:

Well it's been a year since I took office as your president and I am very thankful to be surrounded by a supportive Board and DFTU volunteers and members. Special thanks to Rich DiStanislao, our past president, and Bob Pennell, DFTU Board member, for guiding me through all the administrative tasks to make the chapter function. I guess it went well, as you elected

me for another term at the March meeting.

We accomplished a lot and embarked on new adventures with our chapter. We continue our quest for stream improvements and grants through the leadership of Russ Collins. Our diversion well on Rausch Creek through Dennis Coffman and the "Diversion Well Gang" overcame some glitches and is continuing to improve the PH on the stream. We conducted clean-ups on local streams and helped stock local waters with the PA Fish & Boat Commission. Our Board passed the annual budget with funds generated from fundraising activities, business partners and sponsors. It is interesting to note that membership dues generate a onetime rebate for new members only. Our Chapter does not receive financial support from TU National. Chapter sponsorship continues to grow as we welcomed increased support from existing sponsors and the recruitment of new sponsors. This program started several years ago and enables local businesses to contribute to our chapter mission while gaining focused advertising to over 500 members and friends. Please support them and mention DFTU as you patronize our sponsors.

Education programs are always well received with fly-tying classes, Ladies Day, Trout in the Classroom, and partnerships with area Vets Programs, Ladies Fly Fishing Clubs, Casting for Recovery, Sportsman's Field Days, Angling Clubs, Legislative Conservation Day, and exhibits at Wildwoods Nature Center and Ned Smith Center. We have sponsorships committed for 3 area youth to attend the 2024 Rivers Camp at Messiah College in June. We added the Bass Pro Fishing Festival, Hershey Company Vets Program and a pilot fishing section with the Harrisburg school program "All You Can" as a part of their Leadership Academy. I was pleased to see an increase in new faces among our chapter volunteers. We have added over 100 new members this year, and it is up to us to get them involved in our chapter. More on this under the Membership Update.

Our communications and public relations programs are alive and well under the leadership of Andy Link, webmaster, Becca Fronk, Facebook page manager and graphic designer, and Bill Zeiders, "Hatches" newsletter editor for our chapter activities. We are fortunate to have these talented individuals on our team.

At the March 26th General Membership Meeting, I gave an in-depth look at our chapter and urged members to get involved in some of our great programs. Many hands do make light work, as they say. Beginners Fly Tying Class Wrap-up

Beginners Fly Tying classes started February 1st and concluded on March $7^{\rm th}$. This year we had 10



participants learning basic techniques.
Classes were held at the Palmyra
Sportsman's Club in Palmyra on 6 consecutive
Thursday nights.
The skills taught enabled the

participants to tie inch worms, eggs, squirmy and Walt's worms, muskrat nymphs, zebra midges, bead heads, wet flies, dumbbell eye streamers and wooly buggers using both natural and synthetic materials. A real bonus was the sharing of the history and best uses of each fly, as well as where to fish the fly, and mentor techniques not found in videos and books.

Thanks to DFTU Members and featured tyers Bill Byrne, Joe Noterangelo, Brett Wood, Lou Samsel, Chuck Swanderski and mentors Rick Frazier, Fran Brarilar, Joe Connor and Bill Zeiders for sharing their time and talents with the participants. Always a fun time for our chapter.



Intermediate Fly Tying Class Wrap-up

Our chapter offered an Intermediate Fly-Tying course on February 15th in partnership with the Wildwood Nature Center (Pennsylvania Parks and Recreation). The course was held at the Olewine Nature Center building in Harrisburg on Thursday evenings for 5 consecutive weeks.

We had a total of 9 students in the course, and several of our chapter fly-tiers served as lead tiers and as mentors. The students learned a variety of patterns, including Adams, parachute duns, Grannom caddis, perdigon Euro nymphs, Prince and dragonfly nymphs, marabou Royal Coachman and Clouser Minnow streamers. All the students showed exceptional skills in learning to tie these flies, and often brought in the flies that they tied at home after class.

Special thanks to chapter fly-tiers and mentors Brian Royer, Richard Green, Bill Byrne, Steve Long, Jim Foose, and Rich DiStanislao for their help in making this course successful.

Bass Pro Shop Fishing Festival



On March 16th our chapter was invited to participate in the annual Fishing Festival at Bass Pro Shops. We took advantage of the offer (a new partnership between Bass Pro Shops and TU) to share our mission, distribute literature, offer advice on fishing opportunities in the area, recruit new members and demonstrate tying our favorite patterns. Folks that stopped by our booth were surprised that we are more than just a fishing club. Our literature and posters on the diversion well, ecology, stream improvement and conservation initiated some interesting conversations.

It was a new experience for our chapter and one that we hope continues. We invited the Cumberland Valley Chapter to share our new DFTU "pop up" canopy and swap some TU stories. Thanks to our chapter volunteers and tyers from the two DFTU winter tying classes for sharing their skills and time.

The Stony Valley Group



In February, the crew had a bit more work than usual getting into the project. It wasn't the snow, it was the trees and branches blocking the road into the project. It took the crew of 9 that day and 3 chainsaws two hours to make it into the project, only to find a large tree had fallen over the round well. The tree was removed from around the well over the next three weeks.

This past year – April 1, 2023 to March 31, 2024 – TU Volunteer hours of maintaining the Rausch Creek project were 1008.5 hours. A special thank you to Tony Rose who brought his tractor in March and did a great job moving the stone closer to the wells. During the winter months, with both wells running, the PH has been in the 5.75 - 6.5 range downstream of the project and a PH range of 4.75 - 4.97 upstream of the project.

Note: Starting on April 1, we will move to meeting Monday evenings at 6:00 p.m. throughout the spring and summer season.



Two More Stream Restoration Projects Completed



A couple of weeks into the New year, the Spruce Street project construction on the Quittie was completed. From all reports from folks fishing in that section, it seems that it fishes very well. In the coming months, the chapter will have a tree planting party, so find your shovels and gloves.

This project was funded by Pennsylvania Fish and Boat and the Lebanon County Conservation District. Thanks to both organizations for supporting our work to restore the Quittie.



The second project on the Quittie is the Syner Road Project. Two property owners were gracious to allow us to do the project. Thanks to Mr. and Mrs. Klinefelter and the Palmyra Sportsman Association for their support. Very similar to the Spruce Street project, the eroded embankments were

fixed, and some great fish habitat structure was installed. We will not be planting any trees on this project footprint because the pasture is used to graze dairy cattle. The long-term plan is to phase in additional projects in the same area as funds become available.

Our chapter is by far the conservation leader in the state. We recently applied for two additional grants totaling two million seven hundred fifty thousand dollars. The Lebanon County Conservation District is submitting a one million dollar grant adding to our project portfolio.
